6. I qualified in Medicine in 1967. In 1969 I became an affiliated member of the Royal Medico-Psychological Society (now the Royal College of Psychiatrists). I completed a conjoint Diploma in Psychological Medicine from the UK (1974), and my Membership of the Royal College of General Practitioners the same year (1974). After 5 years of further psychiatry training in Australia, I became a Fellow of the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists through examination (1980). I gained my Certificate of Accreditation in Child/Adolescent Psychiatry from the RANZCP the same year (1980).
7. I received the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2009 for my contributions to youth suicide prevention and child psychiatry.
8. My primary employment contract was with The University of Queensland, as Professor of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. This was from 1 September 2001 until completion of my contract at the end of August 2014. My role with Queensland Health as 'Clinical Director' was nominal and advisory, and did not involve direct management or authority over services. I would describe my position as having professional influence as opposed to having managerial power with regards to child and youth adolescent mental health services.
9. Since completion of my contract with the University of Queensland in August 2014, I have been in part time (2 days a week) private clinical practice as a Child and Family Psychiatrist at Go2HumanPerformance, 468 South Pine Road, Everton Park, 4053. I retired from that service, effective 17 December 2015.

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10. The Key Deliverables for my position as Clinical Director/Chair of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry are provided in full in the Secondary Funding Agreement between The State of Queensland and The University of Queensland for Chair of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Positon. **Exhibit C** to this affidavit is a copy of this document.
11. Briefly, the Key Deliverables for this position included:
- (a) The provision of expert leadership in the area of child and youth mental health issues at state and national levels;
 - (b) Maintaining a close relationship with the Directors, Managers and Policy Officers tasked with planning, developing and implementing the child and youth mental health systems and services at the Queensland Children's Hospital;
 - (c) Supporting the planning, provision and maintenance of quality training and education for child and youth mental health professionals from all relevant disciplines; and
 - (d) Provision of expert clinical direction for the Child and Youth Mental Health Service consistent with best practice and emerging evidence.
12. My employment contract with the University of Queensland required 'expert leadership' and a "close relationship with the Directors, Managers and Policy Officers tasked with planning, developing and implementing the child and youth mental health systems and services...." In all my years in Queensland, I never had direct managerial or directorial 'responsibility for all state-wide and local child and youth mental health services.' This was always vested in senior employees of Queensland Health.
13. Like many medical staff who had worked for many years in the environment of the Queensland Royal Children's Hospital, I found myself somewhat resentful about the

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proposed Queensland Health closure of the hospital at that site and the relocation south of the Brisbane River to the then proposed Lady Cilento Children's Hospital.

14. My roles and duties around the time of the relocation of the Royal Children's Hospital went through a period of time of lack of clarity. At the then age of 68, I could not see myself making the move physically to the new site. In addition, just prior to Christmas 2009 I suffered a spinal condition (Transverse Myelitis), which left me with persisting limitations in my ability to walk any distances. This reduced my ability to attend all the meetings demanded by the development of a new service.

Appointment of Dr Stephen Stathis

15. In a private meeting with Dr Peter Steer in 2012, the then Chief Executive of the Lady Cilento Children's Hospital, I made it clear that I would not be seeking re-employment with the University of Queensland when my current contract expired (at the end of August, 2014).
16. When discussing future senior personnel to manage the development of the new Lady Cilento Children's Hospital, I recommended Dr Stephen Stathis (with his seniority, his energy and dedication, and his training both in child psychiatry and paediatrics) who was in many ways the obvious choice to take on the role in, and responsibility for, the development of the Lady Cilento Children's' Hospital psychiatric services. He was already a senior Consultant in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, a medical officer directly employed by Queensland Health. I had supervised and mentored Dr Stathis regularly over many years, and believed I was in a good position to know the extent of his skill base.

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17. This issue was further discussed at our regular monthly meetings of the Brisbane North CYMHS Executive (Ms Judi Krause, Dr Stephen Stathis, and myself), and we agreed that a new title would be created for Dr Stathis to clarify his role vis-à-vis my own role.
18. I am asked to explain why Dr Stathis assumed responsibility for all state-wide and local child and youth mental health services from 7 January 2013. The phrase in the question "for all state-wide and local child and youth mental health services from 7 January 2013" is not completely accurate. For many years there have been Directors/Managers of CYMH Services in Brisbane South, Robina, Logan, Rockhampton, Townsville and Cairns, responsible to Queensland Health either directly, or through the local Director of the adult services.
19. Associate Professor Brett McDermott, Director of the Mater Kids in Mind had, since his arrival in Queensland in late 2001, taken responsibility for a considerable number of services south of the Brisbane River. My understanding is that this responsibility included Barrett Adolescent Centre, administered through West Moreton.

Experience in the area of adolescent mental health

20. During my time as a GP in Kent, UK (1970-1974), I also worked part time in a child and adolescent service in Kent, under the guidance of Dr Ken Munro Fraser (1971-1974). As part of this I did weekly sessions at Lanthorne House Inpatient Unit, Broadstairs, which was a residential service for 30 children and adolescents. I worked intensively with several adolescents under the direct supervision of Dr Munro Fraser. This experience convinced me that I wanted to cease General Practice and train in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.
21. I migrated to Australia in December 1974, and joined the RANZCP training program in 1975, under Dr Jeffrey Gerard at the Adelaide Children's Hospital. I was supervised by

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a number of consultants for a range of clinical cases, many of whom were adolescents. I trained formally for two years in Family Therapy, in addition to a number of other therapy styles to enhance my clinical skills. I qualified in 1980, and worked as senior registrar at ACH.

22. In 1982, I went into private practice in North Adelaide, and over the next four years personally assessed and managed over 500 referrals, many of whom were adolescents. Many had intensive individual therapy; others had family therapy, depending on the history and context.
23. In August 1986, I was invited to become Clinical Director for a new Child and Adolescent Service at Flinders Medical Centre in South Australia, under Professor Ross Kalucy, Director of Adult Psychiatry. Over the next 15 years the service grew from 12 staff in one team to more than 50 multidisciplinary staff in three metropolitan teams, and a country team comprising three smaller teams. I was involved in considerable training in child, adolescent and family psychiatry for new staff joining our teams. The service won national awards for its community approach to child and adolescent mental health. During that time, I not only continued to assess and directly treat adolescents and their families, but also supervised a large number of registrars in psychiatry and other multidisciplinary staff, and set up research programs (1985-2001) toward youth suicide prevention. We gained a number of large national grants from the Commonwealth to run national training programs I had conceptualised and developed (eg. 'AusEinet', 'Keep Yourself Alive', and 'Out of the Blues' (a service dedicated to depressed adolescents)).
24. Since 2001, I have lectured on adolescent mental health each year to UQ medical students, and supervised registrars in training as well as mentoring new consultants. I have also presented 30-50 lectures each year to community forums and school based

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personnel. My research programs and published papers with the University of Queensland have continued to focus on prevention of self-harm and suicide in adolescents, and the development of relevant community programs in Promotion of Mental Health and Early Intervention in, and Prevention of, mental illness. To further this research I have, since 2001, supervised over 20 Honours in Psychology students, several Masters students and a number of PHD students (please see **exhibit B**).

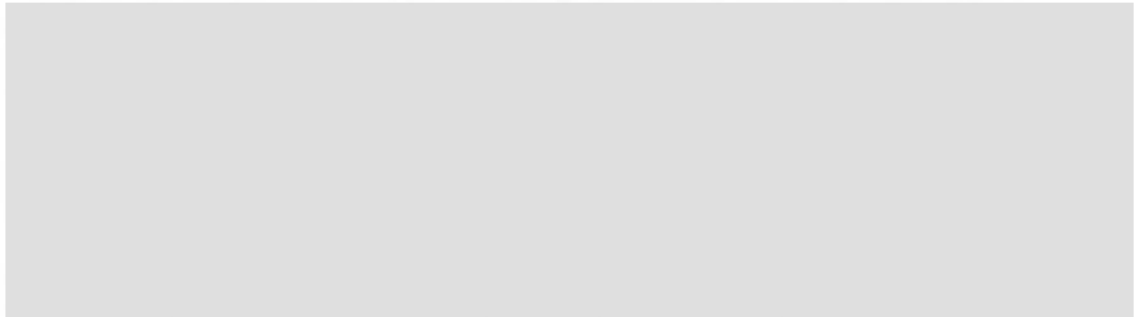
Barrett Adolescent Centre

25. Dr Trevor Sadler was the Director for the Barrett Adolescent Centre. I met Dr Sadler at two state-wide conferences on managing adolescents. I cannot recall the year of these meetings I believe it would have been in the early 2000's. I admired his work, and the dedication he brought to it over many years.
26. I visited Barrett Adolescent Centre on one occasion early in my tenure as Professor (approximately 2004-2005), simply to apprise myself of the work being done there. I cannot recall if I was invited to attend the Barrett Adolescent Centre or if I approached Dr Sadler. I recall I met with Dr Sadler, he showed me the facilities and I met with the Headmaster of the school. I did not meet any of the Barrett Adolescent Centre patients or witness the Barrett Adolescent Centre model in action. I recall I was impressed by the model of care described to me by Dr Sadler. I was also impressed by the fact that Education Queensland thought the Barrett Adolescent Centre important enough to provide a direct service to the patients of that Centre for many years.
27. I have had no direct or indirect input into the operations/model of care for the Barrett Adolescent Centre. As far as I can recall, I have never been formally invited by Queensland Health to comment on any redevelopment of the Barrett Adolescent Centre. As far as I can recall, I have never attended any formal meetings to do with planning the future of Barrett Adolescent Centre.

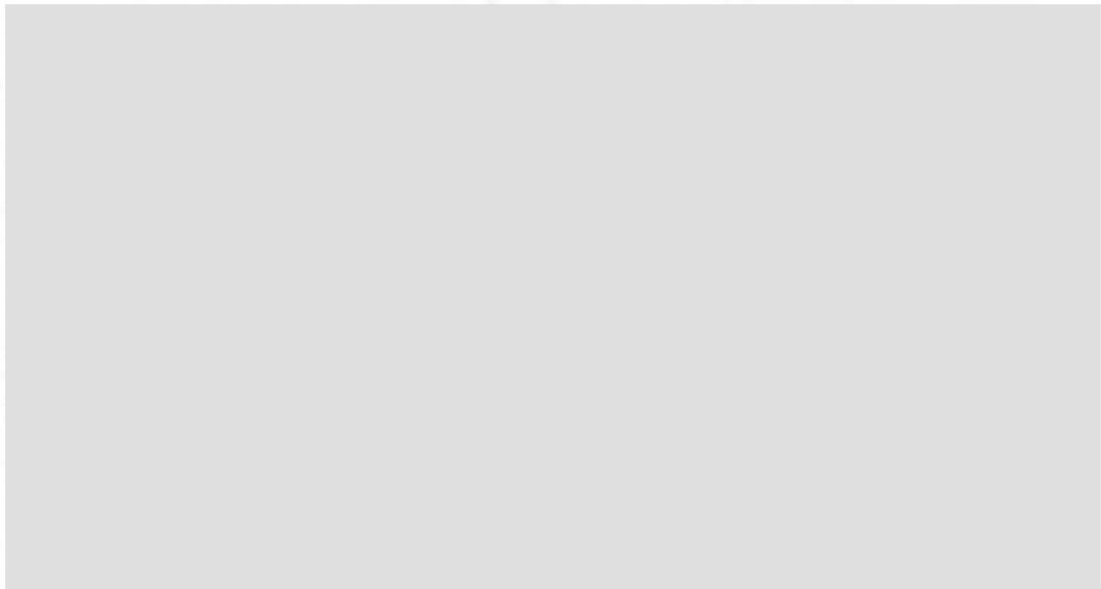
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Referrals to the Barrett Adolescent Centre

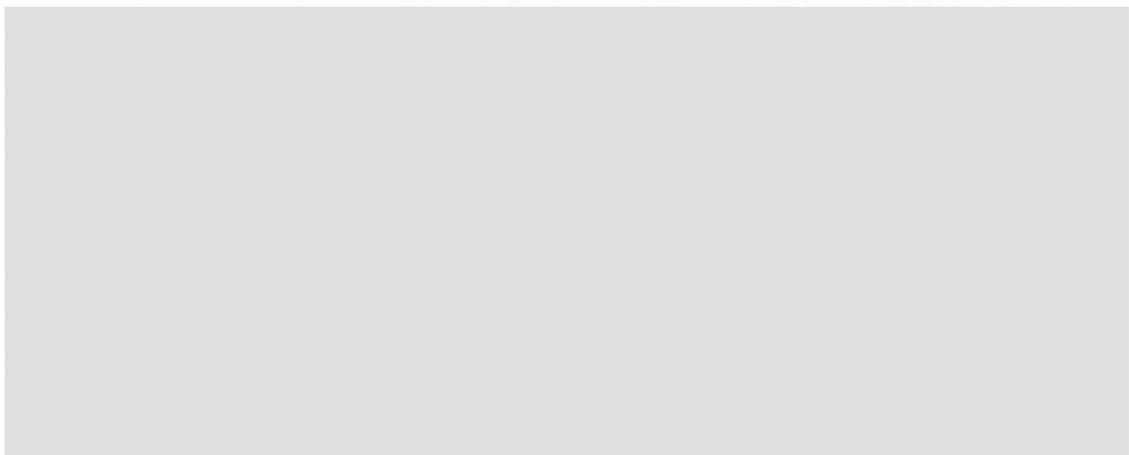
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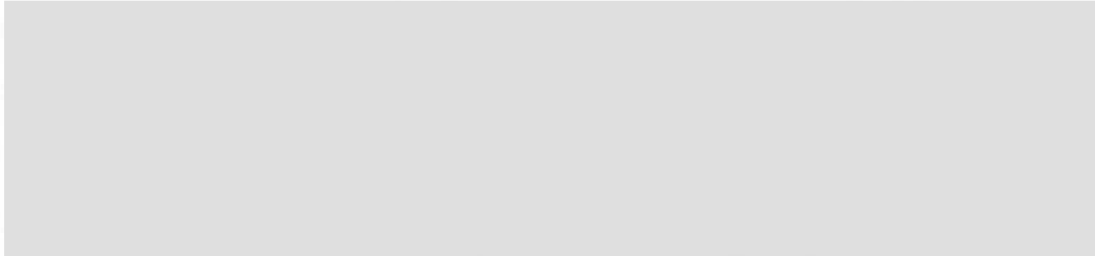
31. As far as I can recall, I have never consulted with a former patient of the Barrett Adolescent Centre.

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32.



33. With regards to details as to the services to which I would now refer patients who might previously have been referred to the Barrett Adolescent Centre, I state the following:

- (a) Throughout my training and experience in child psychiatry and family therapy I have avoided inpatient care where possible;
- (b) I am primarily a child and family therapist, and have come to believe that admission under another professional's care can disrupt the therapy process and the therapeutic alliance necessary for change. It is my preferred practice not to refer patients to inpatient care facilities where it can be safely avoided;
- (c) If it were a matter of safety, and the temporary need for an enclosed environment, I would consider referring any adolescent patient of mine requiring inpatient care to Ward 4F of the Royal Brisbane Hospital.

34. I am unable to comment on the comparative adequacy of services. As far as I know, little such comparison work has been done.

35. Adolescents (from the age of 14 years) in the North Brisbane Catchment come under Adult Services for inpatient programs. I have had no formal role in the management of services at the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital or the Prince Charles Hospital. I would recommend the Commission seek advice from Dr Brett Emmerson, the Director of Mental Health for the Brisbane North Catchment area.

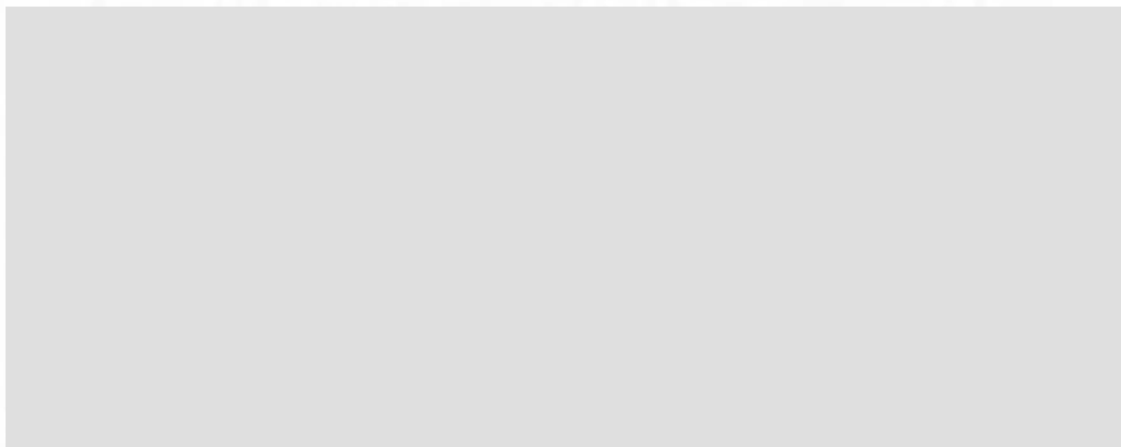
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36. As to the adequacy of the available programs and services for adolescents with mental health concerns in the North Brisbane catchment, from 2012 to 2014, in my supervision of child psychiatrists working in Brisbane North CYMHS community teams (as part of the North Brisbane catchment area), and in the Adolescent Inpatient ward, I have been given no cause to believe the services were inadequate.

Closure of the Barrett Adolescent Centre

37. As far as I can remember, the first time I became truly aware of the possibility that Barrett Adolescent Centre might close was a comment from a colleague that Associate Professor Brett McDermott had raised the issue at the Carmody Royal Commission. I believe this comment was made informally during a meeting of the Queensland Child Death Review Committee. I cannot recall the date this comment was made to me.

38.



39. The front page of the attachments in Exhibit D noted that the service would not continue from the current site, and that it was hoped a new site would be available in early 2014.
40. I had no formal input into the decision to close the Barrett Adolescent Centre.
41. I understand the reason for the decision to close the Barrett Adolescent Centre was the need to condemn the current Barrett Adolescent Centre Building as noted in the 12 pages of the attachment referred to as Exhibit D.

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42. I was saddened that an inpatient service for adolescents with severe and chronic mental health problems was to close. In particular, I was saddened because (to the best of my knowledge) the Barrett Adolescent Centre had a good reputation for helping these adolescents. I had to accept the decision to close the service based on the building being condemned.
43. I did not attend any meetings regarding the possible closure of the Barrett Adolescent Centre.

Concerns about the closure of the Barrett Adolescent Centre

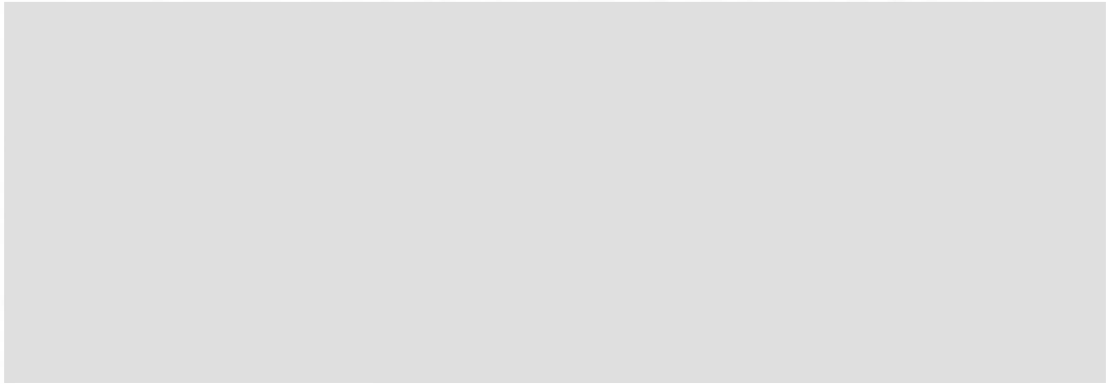
44. As stated above, I did have concerns that there was no viable alternative to the Barrett Adolescent Centre. I expressed these concerns to other child psychiatrists informally during supervision or in other informal meetings. There were no 'circumstances', and no formal meetings I attended where I expressed any concerns.
45. As noted above I supervised and mentored child psychiatrists. In some of those conversations, the issue would likely have arisen and been discussed.
46. I cannot elaborate further on my concerns, other than to say I was concerned that there appeared to be no viable alternative to the Barrett Adolescent Centre.
47. Following the closure of the Barrett Adolescent Centre, as far as I can understand, no viable alternative to the Barrett Adolescent Centre has been created.
